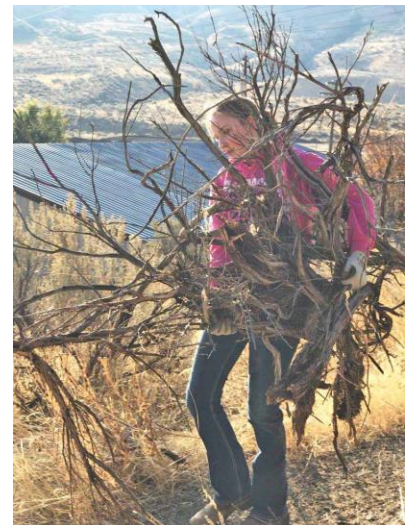

ROPING

Now that we have moved back indoors, we are roping every Friday night at 7PM. We also have two (2) Saturday ropings; Nov. 4th & 18th. We will be awarding Red Bluff Buckles to 3 high money division winners over both Saturday.-: #1 - #1.5, #2 - #2.5, & 3 and over divisions. Ropers must attend both ropings to receive high money awards.

The roping club will continue to practice every Tuesday night at 7PM in the indoor arena. The fee is only \$10 for members and \$15 for non-members to practice. We would like to encourage everyone that is interested in exposing their horses to cattle, please to come join us.

We are having Team Sorting practice on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of each month, through the winter months (began in October). Appleatchee members pay \$15, and non-members \$20. Practice starts at 6PM for set up. Everyone gets a full 2 minutes in the pen sorting, with a minimum of 3 times each. We finished up the “summer” sorting series last weekend in a fun competition with 19 riders, 12 of which were from the Spokane, Yakima, and Snohomish areas! (Where are all you locals?!) The cattle were lots of fun to sort (not too wild!), and the weather was perfect.

Thanks to **Jeannie King** (left) for making us a delicious lunch of pulled pork sandwiches! The final summer series scores are in and the winner of the upper division is **Laura Wagner**, with **John Lehmkuhl** second. In the lower division, **Ernie Hockens** from Zillah took the buckle, and **Mark Farley** from Snohomish came in second. Congratulations!

The winter sorting series begins with competition on November 11! Next up will be sorting on **December 9**. We will continue to start with 3-goes of 3-man sorting, and then ride 6-goes of 2-man sorting. All teams are drawn, so you don't need to come with a partner. The rules are changed a bit: goes are 75 seconds, instead of 90 seconds; and we will score riders based on total cows sorted in clean runs, not the number of clean runs first. Also, we are thinking of having a buyback pot to see if we can liven things up. The buyback is a separate prize pot within the competition that you can enter if you have at least one dirty run up to the entry cutoff,

which will be the first 3-4 goes (we have not decided). The idea is that you will have a second chance to earn cash if you don't think you can win in the main competition. You also can win the main competition too. Stay tuned via email or on Facebook.

We practice on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month at 6 PM.

Practice sessions are a great time to see if you like the sport or to test out a new horse. Cost is \$15 for at least 3 goes (+\$5 arena fee for non-members). **Willy Hart** is coming back once a month to coach practice, probably starting **November 8**. Willy will help you and your horse with advice before, during, and after your runs. Cost for coached practice is \$30. I'll let you know ASAP. Please arrive at 6 PM to help setup the pen and mark cattle; the crew will take down the pen the next day. You earn a \$5 credit toward sorting fees when you help with the pen. Check in with Joanne.

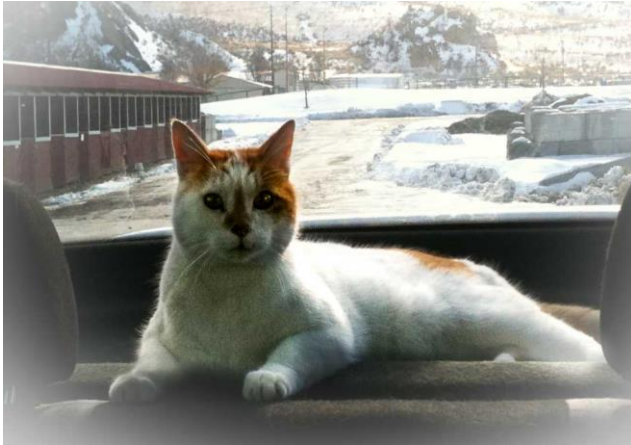


RIP, Valentine. Thank you for everything you've done for me and my children.
